•	Almost as good, but not quite, is a rubric. A
	rubric also has multiple areas of, and

	closely, a frequency rubric really only has descriptions of one level of
	, the "proficient" level, and the other three are just
	variations in the frequency or consistency of that performance.
•	Frequency rubrics are still useful, because they provide you with plenty of

•	Be aware that there's a risk when focusing on frequency, or quantity, rather
	than quality, and that makes it much harder to be accurate in your final
	evaluation, at the end of the year.
•	If the only difference between "" and
