

- Give the teacher something to work on
- Write a unique "love letter" to every teacher
- Address every criterion in detail




The "Pareto Principle" or "80/20 Rule"



80% of your teachers will take 20% of your time 20% of your teachers will take 80% of your time

Unsats: 20% of the 20% will take 80% of the 80%

The Anna Karenina Principle





"Happy families are all alike; every unhappy family is unhappy in its own way."

Saving Time with the Anna Karenina Principle



- When the same descriptions apply to multiple teachers...re-use them!
- Provide teacher-specific evidence from your notes
- Don't strive for 100% unique language in every evaluation—strive for reasonable fit & specific evidence

The "Working Hypothesis" Approach

- The
 Instructional

- In a given domain, teachers fall into certain "buckets" or categories that you mentally lump together:
 - —Classroom Management: Warm, Loose, Strict, Student-Directed
 - —Instructional Skill: Growing, Skilled, PD Leader
 - —Reflective Practice: Self-directed, Collaborative, Introspective
- Decide which domains you'll address
- Decide on initial "buckets" or "types" within each domain
- Re-use your writing when making the same claim about multiple teachers

"Categorizing my evals into the folks who are all proficient and distinguished (we use Danielson framework) and simply using the language of the rubric repeatedly - I add some examples from walkthrough notes and it's pretty quick and painless!

That frees up more time for the ones I need to spend more time on – the ones that could be challenged or could lead to disciplinary action down the road – still use the language of the framework but I have to be way more careful that my examples support the language."



When writing a summative (annual) evaluation for a teacher, I use elements of the actual evidence and feedback from their classroom observations and combine them into concise statements. This makes the feedback on the annual evaluation meaningful and familiar.



CEIJ, by Jon Saphier

- Claim
- Evidence
- Interpretation
- Judgment



CEIJ: The Claim



A summary statement describing the teacher's typical practice in a given area.

Key phrase: "Is characterized by..."

CEIJ: The Evidence



Multiple, specific, documented incidents and instances that support the claim.

Key phrase: "For example, on _/_/_..."

CEIJ: The Interpretation



A clear articulation of the consequences of the teacher's typical practice, e.g. on student learning, school culture, or other relevant outcomes.

Key phrase: "As a result..."

CEIJ: The Judgment



The final rating of teacher's overall practice in specific area, using language and scale of evaluation framework.

Key phrase: "Therefore, ____'s practice in domain ____ is best described as Level ____."


