

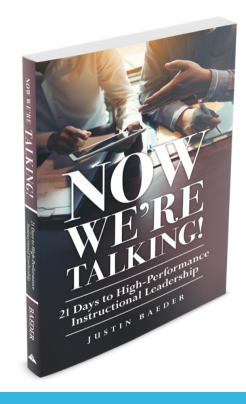

Instructional Leadership— A Definition

Instructional leadership is the practice of making and implementing operational and improvement decisions in the service of student learning.



### A False Dichotomy?

In practice, the division of the principalship into "instructional leadership" and "mere management" is a false dichotomy.







## Management is the Foundation

- You can be a manager without being an instructional leader, but...
- You can't be an instructional leader without being an effective manager
- Teachers can only improve their instruction with effective managerial support



# Who & What Are We Managing?

- Teachers are professionals
- Teaching is professional work
- Teachers must exercise professional judgment with a high degree of autonomy under conditions of uncertainty
- Improving teaching is mainly about improving professional judgment

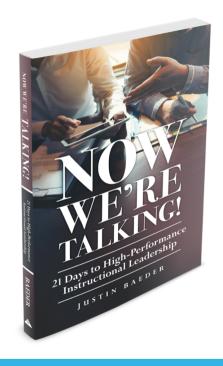

### What Leaders Need

More than anything else, instructional leaders need two things:

- 1. Relationships
- 2. Information



### An Action Plan

- Get into classrooms when you can, as often as you can
- If you can't, put equal effort into 1:1 conversations
- Recommendation: 3/day



## Scheduling 1:1 Conversations

- With no agenda, "checking in" can feel very awkward for staff who may not really feel like talking
- Depending on people to "feel like talking" may result in NEVER talking
- Use the same "cycles" approach you use for walkthroughs



### Tips for 1:1 Conversations

- Voice only—not video
- Communicate your plan
- Ask everyone to schedule a time
- Keep track & follow through

Ramping Up: Your First 3 Cycles

#### 1. Break the ice

- Be present and pleasant
- Get people used to your presence
- Get yourself into the habit

### 2. Notice More

- Keep at it
- Pay closer attention
- Share what you're noticing



Ramping Up: Your First 3 Cycles

### 3. Get More Serious

- Follow through
- Take more notes
- Ask better questions
